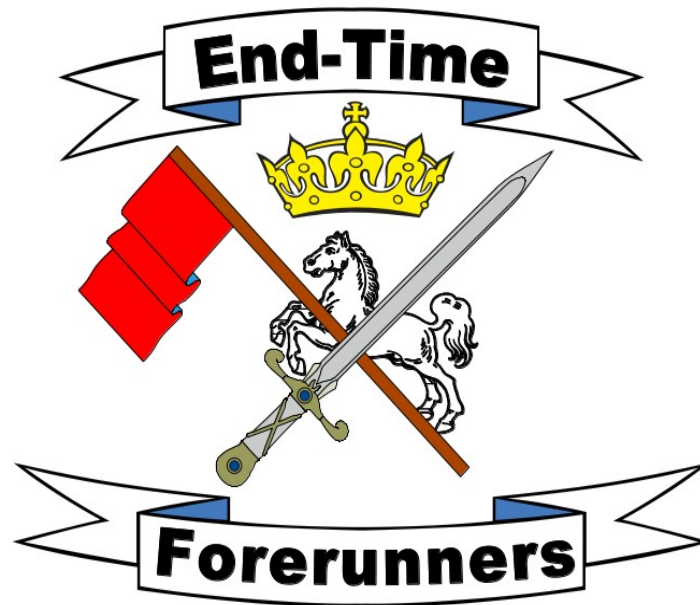

Did You Know?

Is this what the Bible says?

Righteousness exalts a nation

Proverbs 14:34a (NKJV)

What about the Amplified?

Righteousness [moral and
spiritual integrity and virtuous
character] exalts a nation

Proverbs 14:34a (AMP)

Did You Know?

**These are *NOT*
accurate
translations**

What does the Hebrew have to say?

'Tz'dakah' (Hb) can be translated 'righteousness'.

'Tz'dakah' can be translated also as 'charity'.

Did You Know?

To the Jew, *Tz'dakah* encompasses something from both these English words.

What was meant in the Hebrew in Proverbs 14?

Righteous charity exalts a
nation

Tz'dakah is like *Shalom* – it's more complex than the usual translation

Shalom – is translated 'peace'

Shalom – also includes
'completeness', 'welfare' &
'health'. i.e. all God's
goodness.

Did You Know?

“For centuries for the Jewish people, *tz’dakah* has been a community dynamic, a targeted generosity that helps those in the community in need, while simultaneously building the community, with a focus on strengthening the emerging generation.”
