

It's Not an Apostolic Movement

The current apostolic revelation is not a movement. It is not something that is 'pushed' by a group of people for their own agenda and for their own purposes, however godly it may seem. It's not a movement like the suffragette movement which was pushed by women to get their vote. It wasn't a movement like the reformation movement which was an attempt to get away from the dominance of Roman Catholicism. It's also not a movement like the Salvation Army and the Anglican Church Army where they dressed in army uniforms because they were exemplifying the fact that they were in God's Christian army.

Movements come and go – if people don't drive it they die. That was the fate of the Methodist movement which came out of the Holy Spirit's work with John and Charles Wesley.

The current apostolic revelation is a move of God, not a movement of man. It's a move of God to reinstate the apostolic as the leadership, the guiding oversight of the church.

The apostolic and the prophetic were lost around 200AD. The apostolic is being restored today and the prophetic is being restored, and it has been so for the past 30 years, approximately. What we lost over time when Christianity was converted to a religion, the Lord over the last 500 years or so has been restoring much of that.

The apostolic is a revelation that the apostles need to be at the helm. It is not an emphasis or a movement within the structured church to replace pastors as church leaders with apostles. Nor is it to call church leaders apostles, rather than pastors or ministers. It's a genuine move of God because of the need now, in preparation for end times, is for a proper connection to be made between Heaven and the church. This is what the apostolic and the prophetic do – their focus is on Heaven. Their focus is on bringing Fathers will down onto Earth to be done.

There are many people who use the word 'apostolic' as a jargon term, as the latest "flavour of the month". You must discern with your spirit and mind how it's being used, so that you can understand where a person who uses the term is coming from. Don't accept any person, or any organisation, that uses the term 'apostolic' as having Father's understanding of the apostolic. Suss it out. Find where the heart of the matter is with them. This is important.
