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Summary So Far

- (1) The first verse in Revelation gives us the purpose of the book
- (2) The book is **not** definitively introduced as "the revelation of Jesus"
- (3) The introduction could easily be stated as "the revelation from Jesus"
- (4) The revelation was give to Jesus by Father




Summary So Far

- (5) The revelation was specifically for Jesus' followers (his "servants")
- (6) The revelation was to inform them about what was soon ("shortly") to happen because the time was "near"
- (7) The Greek text allows any number of interpretations for the reason for the Book NOT just one interpretation



Revelation is one of the main stumbling blocks to understanding salvation

Modern theology based on Revelation will cancel any reprogramming into the reality of salvation



A Kingdom principle:

We need to end up having the Trinity's mind on everything. Without it we're not living in reality

This is why an investigation into Revelation is essential

We already know that Matthew 24 doesn't point to the time of The End just before Jesus' return

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Matthew 24, Mark 13 and Luke 21 read in conjunction with each other give the right understanding - the destruction of Jerusalem and the Jewish nation as well as it's religious system

This destruction of the Jewish system was spiritual preparation for the end of the OC and the introduction of the NC

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Jesus' discourse was actually a prophetic message to alert the Jews of his day to what was coming because of their apostasy.

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It was also to prepare Jesus' disciples and their converts for a mass evacuation from Jerusalem



This understanding of the Gospels and Revelation is known as the Preterist view of eschatology

It's important to remind ourselves of the historic facts behind the Preterist view so we are not sidetracked in our understanding of Revelation



Revelation <u>cannot</u> be proved to be an outline of end-time eschatology based on Matthew 24

That would give an erroneous interpretation of Revelation



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
