

QUESTION: “Why Do You Call Him Father?”

You’ve noticed that I use the phrase "ask Father" and not "ask the Father" in my teaching. That can be a problem if you didn’t have a good relationship with your paternal father or step-father, or you were raised by a single mother. Using those terms would be a challenge for you.

Also addressing Jesus as "our King" has been a challenge for you, as it is for all Christians. In both cases of using those reference titles, what you need is not just a spiritual shift, but a mental one as well.

In response to your query, everything in the Kingdom must come through revelation. These revelations are deposited in your spirit by Holy Spirit, and are moved to your mind, where they become revelations that you ascent to. The reason for that is that everything you believe, must come from Heaven.

These revelations produce paradigm shifts, which allow you to completely delete what you thought was true, and accept what Father shows you as a replacement.

We know that the truth will set us free, but that only happens when the truth we seek is the Truth himself,¹ not a holy book or the teachings of men.

One revelation you’ll get over time, if you pursue where the Spirit is leading you, is that we aren’t Christians. We’re sons of God, who are learning to living the way we were meant to live, without any religion.

Another revelation you need to get, is that, as a son, you’ve been adopted into Father’s family. Read the parable of 'the prodigal son' in the Passion Translation or the Living Bible² to get a feel of the transaction of adoption that’s taken place with your heavenly Father when you came home to him. Jesus was telling us that the son who rejected his father and their life together was immediately re-installed as the son he originally was. That happened as soon as his father heard his request to come home.³

Knowing you’re a much-loved adopted son, should move you into a loving relationship with one or all members of the Trinity. They want this relationship to become an intimate one, because that’s how they created us to relate to them. Their main relational aim in adopting us, is to become one with each of us.⁴

I’ve been in this intimacy and oneness with them for quite some time now, even though I still have a long way to go to be where they desire me to be in oneness. That’s the reason I can talk to Father God and refer to him as "Father". It’s personal, because I know him as my perfect Father who loves me passionately. That’s right now, not 2,000 years ago when he sent his Son to do what was needed to bring us back into his family (not just to reintroduce the Kingdom back on Earth).

Also, Jesus’ status at the moment is 'King of Kings' and 'Lord of Lords'. That’s why I honour him with the title of "our King" or "my King" or "The King". He’s no longer the Messiah, the Christ. That was the historic person, the man Jesus of Nazareth. Being the messiah is what he did, not who he is now.

All the revelations outlined will come to you, if you desire the oneness with them that they want with you.

REMEMBER: Sonship is a journey of growth and development. It’s a long-haul journey, not a race. So relax and let yourself be taught and trained by the Spirit.
