## The 5 Points of Interpreting Scripture

(Based on the poster by Jonathan Welton with the same title)<sup>1</sup>

- **1** The meaning the writer intended and the expected interpretation of the hearers or readers.
- 2 The text must never be interpreted to mean anything different to point #1.
- **3** Christian theology or doctrine must <u>not</u> be used in the interpretation.
- **4** The original wording, grammar and language of the author's period in history is critical to understanding the true meaning of any text.
- **5** It is essential to know the historic setting in which the text was written.

NOTE: Contextual questions always need to be asked about a piece of text:

- What Covenant was the writer under?
- Who was the leader or king at the time of writing?
- Where was the text written?
- Who were the intended readers?
