The King's Assistance is Not Always Spiritual

The Kingdom principle is that we are to look to the King for all our needs to be met. He's promised he'll do that, but it requires considerable faith to comply with that principle. In opposition to that principle, the world teaches us to be self-reliant, independent and to "do your own thing". That, of course, is anti-Kingdom and doesn't lead us into receiving all the benefits that the Kingdom can supply.

In addition to our source of supply, he's taught us to rely on him for <u>all our very personal needs</u>, as well. That includes our emotional, mental, spiritual, physical, relational, health and love needs. He wants us to lean into him for that, so that we're drawing whatever we can from him and allowing him to supply the rest.

At whatever level of sonship maturity we're in at the present time, it's essential we're relying on him to meet our needs. However, the important thing is not to get super-spiritual about it. This was an issue that I observed among Charismatics and Pentecostals when I was in their systems (and I was guilty of the same thing myself). You see, we can't expect miracles all the time, and we can't expect that our needs will always be angelically supplied through their manifestation. Those attitudes are a step outside of reality that we must be wary of.

From my experience, needs are met by him in a number of ways, some of which can very often be 'out-of-the-box'. That means, contrary to 'spiritual' intuition, help and assistance can be supplied by mechanisms inside the world system. Therefore, we can't reject them because they don't have a veneer of spirituality about them. Here's what I mean: Imagine rejecting an ambulance coming to your aid because you've fallen and broken your leg. Should you reject the paramedic's treatment because they're not angels or because the Spirit didn't tell you that they would be the source of your supply? No.

In this regard, our Beloved King has recently advised us not to reject assistance that comes from unlikely sources:

"I, the Lord, am making a way for you to get the help you have desired and needed. But, you must not refuse the support when it comes, even when it is from an unlikely source. This will be a key moment in your life that can bring constructive change or not. The outcome depends on your acceptance of the assistance provided."²

It's obvious from his message that we're not walking in a relaxed mode and allowing him to do things his way. Otherwise, he wouldn't need to send us his instruction on the matter.

Notice in his message that unlikely assistance that he sends to us can be the catalyst for the changes he wants to bring in our lives. We'd be foolish to reject or overlook such supply, wouldn't we?

Notice, also, that his outcomes can (and usually do) depend on us accepting <u>his</u> supply, not the supply that <u>we</u> want or expect.
